The following chart presents, for the past five years, significant statistics pertaining to FISA.



SECTION 1: INTRODUCTION (U)

This report is submitted pursuant to sections 108(a), 306, and 406, of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act of 1978 (FISA or the Act), as amended, 50 U.S.C. §§ 1801-1812, 1821-1829, 1841-1846, 1861-1862, 1871, 1881-1881g, 1885-1885c. It includes information concerning electronic surveillance, physical searches, pen register/trap and trace (PR/TT) surveillance, and requests for access to certain business records for foreign intelligence purposes conducted under the Act by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, the Central Intelligence Agency, and/or the National Security Agency during the period July 1, 2010 through December 31, 2010.2 Consistent with the Department of Justice's (DOJ's) efforts to keep Congress fully informed of FISA activities in a manner consistent with the national security, this report contains information beyond that required by the statutory provisions set forth above. (S)


d) Pen Register/Trap and Trace Surveillance (U)

Between July 1 and December 31, 2010, the United States filed 47 applications with the FISC seeking authorization for the FBI to conduct PR/TT surveillance pursuant to 50 U.S.C. §§ 1841-1846, as amended. In these 47 applications, 26 named U.S. persons were the targets of PR/TT surveillance. The FISC did not deny in whole or in part, or substantively modify any FBI PR/TT applications during this reporting period. (S)

e) Emergency Electronic Surveillance, Physical Search or PR/TT Surveillance (U)


During this reporting period, the Attorney General¹³ authorized emergency electronic surveillance, physical search, and/or PR/TT surveillance pursuant to 50 U.S.C. §§ 1805(e), 1824(e), 1843(a)-(b), or 1881c(d), (b) (1), These emergency authorizations resulted in O ut of

and 3 applications for authority to conduct PR/TT surveillance op All applications were filed with the FISC within the time limits set forth in FISA. The FISC approved all of the applications. (S)





III. Compliance (U)



In connection with each incident, NSD asks the FBI to identify what steps have been taken to prevent a recurrence. In addition, NSD meets periodically with certain communications providers; one of the purposes of those meetings is to ensure that the providers understand what the FISC has authorized. (U)


Update to Incidents Reported in 07-1 (U)

d) Pen Register/Trap and Trace Surveillance (U)

During this reporting period, the United States filed **two** applications with the FISC pursuant to a b(1) and b(3) to conduct PR/TT surveillance pursuant to 50 U.S.C. §§ 1841-1846, as amended. The matter has been the subject of congressional briefings. One of these cases was approved in part and denied in part; the other was approved. (S)
