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## **Community Support Program (AKA Eye in the Sky)**

# **Background and Program Description:**

- The Community Support Program (CSP) equips a plane with wide area motion imagery technology.
- Flying above the city, the technology would be able to capture wide swaths of the city at a given time and transfer near real time (3-5 second delay) images to analysts on the ground.
- Integrating the imagery with 911 calls or self-reported police activity, analysts would be able to track movement (particularly of cars and to a lesser extent people) at and around the location of critical criminal incidents (shootings, homicides, robberies, etc).
- This information could then be integrated with CitiWatch cameras and license plate readers to generate investigative leads.
- CSP does not capture images that include identifiable information. The resolution is limited to only one pixel per person.
- The technology was tested in Baltimore City in 2016.

# **Specific Programmatic Offer:**

- Program costs covered for three years (plane, analysts, etc.)
- Reimbursement for 30 officers' overtime spent on investigations connected to CSP findings
- Informally funders have expressed interest in financially supporting infrared technology to allow the plane to fly at night (note: limited testing of this technology integrated with CSP)
- Funders have informally expressed interest in issuing formal polls in the field to gauge community interest, buy-in, and support

#### **Other Considerations:**

- Evidence from the program has never been used in court to secure convictions and analysts from CSP have never given expert testimony.
- Program leaders have been presenting publicly that the program will result in a "20-30% reduction in crime in the first year alone." After discussing this with the program leaders, we've determined that this is merely a guess and is not backed by *any* science or data.
- While the program has been tested briefly in a handful of jurisdictions, the program has never been fully implemented or evaluated.
- Currently, the program only operates during daylight hours. More than 50% of Baltimore's homicides and shootings occur in the evening hours.
- Though the program was tested briefly in Baltimore in 2016 and captured imagery from a few notable incidents, CSP was not able to provide specific examples of times when the program led to concrete case outcomes in Baltimore (i.e., arrests or convictions).

## **Proposed Mayor's Office Position:**

• We support the Police Commissioner's decision on what tools and strategies will best assist the Baltimore Police Department in reducing crime.
