ICE's use of Facial Recognition Services Management and Administration

Background:

ICE HSI routinely encounters digital images of potential victims or individuals suspected of crimes but cannot connect those images to identifiable information through existing investigative means and methods. HSI, therefore, submits those images to government agencies and commercial vendors (e.g., Clearview) to compare against their digital image galleries via facial recognition processes. The agencies and vendors query their databases and return lists of potential matches that HSI can use to produce investigative leads. These facial recognition services (FRS) use their own algorithms and business processes to determine the probability that an image submitted by ICE might match images in their galleries. ICE conducted a Privacy Impact Assessment (PIA) because the use of FRS entails the collection, maintenance, and dissemination of personally identifiable information (PII). Claims in this PIA have been reviewed and vetted through ICE IGP, HSI leadership, ICE OPLA, and the DHS Privacy Office. Once the DHS Chief Privacy Officer approves the PIA, the PIA will be posted publicly on the DHS Privacy website.

The following talking points are designed to support OPA and OCR to respond to media and Congressional inquiries on this topic:

Talking Points

- ICE has published this PIA to increase transparency and visibility regarding our efforts using facial recognition services (whether federal, state, or commercial) in furtherance of our mission. Publishing this PIA is a requirement under the E-Government Act of 2002.
- Publishing the PIA will help ICE defend itself against claims that we are not adequately
 protecting individual privacy and civil liberties in our use of facial recognition services. ICE
 can use this PIA to respond to inquiries from the media, Congress, advocacy groups, and
 FOIA requests.
- ICE's use of facial recognition services (FRS) is used to generate leads and identify potential investigation subjects or victims who likely match the image submitted by ICE.
- ICE does not take enforcement action solely based on an FRS return; our agents and officers need to do additional investigative work to establish "probable cause."
- ICE's use of commercial FRS has helped to identify multiple individuals engaged in child exploitation and other crimes related to child safety.
- All images returned from commercial FRS come from publicly available sources otherwise accessible to ICE personnel.
- Before submitting an FRS query, ICE personnel must use reasonable efforts to identify the
 individual through existing means and methods, such as government database queries and
 open source research.



- ICE will only use FRS approved for facial recognition identification (either through supervisory approval or the HSI Operational Systems Development and Management Unit OSDM)
- ICE has disabled functionality in commercial FRS (i.e., Clearview), so that ICE images are not stored or retained by the vendor.
- ICE only submits photographs in furtherance of an ongoing investigation. ICE is developing training and Rules of Behavior (in conjunction with DHS Science & Technology, DHS Privacy, and DHS Civil Rights and Civil Liberties) to ensure appropriate use of FRS, consistent with claims made in the PIA. Personnel who fail to comply or use FRS for unlawful purposes will be disciplined in accordance with ICE policy.





Background: The White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP) issued a Request for Information (RFI) to the general public, private sector, NGOs, and government agencies, requesting input on past deployments, proposals, pilots, or trials, and current use of biometric technologies for the purposes of identity verification, identification of individuals, and inference of attributes including individual mental and emotional states. The purpose of this RFI is to understand the extent and variety of biometric technologies in past, current, or planned use; the domains in which these technologies are being used; the entities making use of them; current principles, practices, or policies governing their use; and the stakeholders that are, or may be, impacted by their use or regulation. The RFI comment period closes on January 15, 2022. 
ICE Biometrics Systems

Homeland Security Investigations (HSI) oversees programs and conducts operations to identify and apprehend removable aliens, to detain these individuals when necessary, and to remove illegal aliens from the United States.

- Biometric Identification Transnational Migration Alert Program (BITMAP)
 - BITMAP is a HSI led program, supported by Customs and Border Protection (CBP) and DoD, that trains and equips foreign counterparts to conduct targeted collections of biometric and biographic data on persons of interest. Foreign partners share this data with HSI to populate and enhance U.S. government databases. BITMAP in currently in use with over 40 law enforcement agencies in 16 countries.
- Clearview AI
 - HSI Child Exploitation Unit utilizes a small number of Clearview AI licenses for facial recognition in support of its mission.

Enforcement and Removal Operations (ERO) oversees programs and conducts operations to identify and apprehend removable aliens, to detain these individuals when necessary, and to remove illegal aliens from the United States.

- EAGLE
 - Biometric capture, search only, and booking/enrollment
- EDDIE
 - Mobile application for biometric identification

 - Receives Immigration Alien Queries (IAQs) and generates Immigration Alien Responses (IARs) based primarily on biometric IDENT-NGI Interoperability matches







Facial recognition firm Clearview AI tells investors it is seeking massive expansion beyond law enforcement

The Washington Post [2/16/2022 12:47 PM, Drew Harwell, 12597K] reports that the facial recognition company Clearview AI is telling investors it is on track to have 100 billion facial photos in its database within a year, enough to ensure "almost everyone in the world will be identifiable," according to a financial presentation from December obtained by The Washington Post. Those images — equivalent to 14 photos for each of the 7 billion people on Earth — would help power a surveillance system that has been used for arrests and criminal investigations by thousands of law enforcement and government agencies around the world. And the company wants to expand beyond scanning faces for the police, saying in the presentation that it could monitor "gig economy" workers and is researching a number of new technologies that could identify someone based on how they walk, detect their location from a photo or scan their fingerprints from afar. The 55-page "pitch deck," the contents of which have not been reported previously, reveals surprising details about how the company, whose work already is controversial, is positioning itself for a major expansion, funded in large part by government contracts and the taxpayers the system would be used to monitor. The document was made for fundraising purposes, and it is unclear how realistic its goals might be. Clearview was a little-known start-up until a New York Times report in early 2020, based on internal emails and public records uncovered by researchers, revealed the extent to which local police departments had begun using it to find potential suspects. The company said it has since grown its client list to more than 3,100 law enforcement agencies in the United States. It has contracts with the Department of Homeland Security, the FBI and the Army. The company said that it expects to increase its annual federal revenue to \$6 million this year, thanks to active expansions with DHS and the FBI and an "imminent" expansion from the Drug Enforcement Administration, and that it hopes to "increase overall usage" by state and local police agencies by 300 percent. U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, a DHS agency, signed a one-year contract with Clearview in September that could extend to three years. totaling \$1.5 million, federal records show. The FBI signed an \$18,000 one-year contract in December; the presentation says it will grow to \$2.4 million this year. The DEA declined to comment, and the FBI and ICE did not respond to requests for comment.

Dear Secretary Mayorkas:

We write regarding the Department of Homeland Security's use of Clearview AI's facial recognition technology. In August 2021, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) published a report identifying the Secret Service, Immigrations and Customs Enforcement (ICE), and Customs and Border Protection (CBP), as federal entities that have used Clearview AI's technology. Facial recognition tools pose a serious threat to the public's civil liberties and privacy rights, and Clearview AI's product is particularly dangerous. We urge you to immediately stop the Department's use of facial recognition technology, including Clearview AI's tools.

Clearview AI's technology could eliminate public anonymity in the United States. It reportedly allows users to capture and upload photos of strangers, analyze the photographed individuals' biometric information, and provide users with existing images and personal information of the photographed individuals found online. Clearview AI reportedly scrapes billions of photos from social media sites without permission from or notice to the pictured individuals.² In conjunction with the company's facial recognition capabilities, this trove of personal information is capable of fundamentally dismantling Americans' expectation that they can move, assemble, or simply appear in public without being identified. Reports indicate that use of this technology is already threatening to do so.³

This is especially troubling because studies show that when individuals believe the government is surveilling them, they are likely to avoid engaging in activities protected by the First Amendment.⁴ The use of facial recognition technology runs the risk of deterring the public from participating in marches or rallies, or speaking out against injustice, to give just two examples,

for fear of being permanently included in law enforcement databases. In short, this technology utilizes a high level of surveillance that is often inconsistent with Americans' right to privacy.

Additionally, this technology poses unique threats to Black communities, other communities of color, and immigrant communities. An analysis of facial recognition tools conducted by the National Institute of Standards and Technology (NIST) found that Black, Brown, and Asian individuals were up to 100 times more likely to be misidentified than white male faces. ⁵ Consistent with this research, at least three Black men have already been wrongfully arrested based on a false facial recognition match. ⁶

Facial recognition technology like Clearview's poses unique threats to marginalized communities in ways that extend beyond the tools' inaccuracy issues. Communities of color are systematically subjected to over-policing,⁷ and the proliferation of biometric surveillance tools is, therefore, likely to disproportionately infringe upon the privacy of individuals in Black, Brown, and immigrant communities. With respect to law enforcement use of biometric technologies specifically, reports suggest that use of the technology has been promoted among law enforcement professionals, ⁸ and reviews of deployment of facial recognition technology show that law enforcement entities are more likely to use it on Black and Brown individuals than they are on white individuals.⁹ Additionally, past law enforcement use of this technology reportedly targeted Black Lives Matter activists.¹⁰

Use of increasingly powerful technologies like Clearview AI's have the concerning potential to violate Americans' privacy rights and exacerbate existing injustices. Therefore, as the authors of the *Facial Recognition and Biometric Technology Moratorium Act* (S. 2052/H.R. 3907) — which would halt a federal agency or official from using these technologies¹¹ — we urge you to stop use of facial recognition tools, including Clearview AI's products.

Government Relies on Industry for Facial Recognition Technology

- o Contractors divided over whether to use facial recognition
- o Government uses technology for screening, law enforcement

The contracting community is at odds over the use of facial recognition technology as the federal government appears willing to continue to pay for it.

The government uses private sector facial recognition tools for activities like streamlining entry at security checkpoints or identifying suspects during criminal investigations.

Two major contractors—<u>Idemia</u> and Clearview AI—say they plan to continue using facial recognition, while <u>Microsoft</u> announced last month that it would limit its suite of artificial intelligence offerings.

Microsoft is part of a growing chorus of advocates arguing that regulations, standards, and, in some cases, outright bans are needed if the government is to continue buying the nascent tech tools from the private sector.

Idemia partners with the Department of Homeland Security to identify and approve travelers at airports. It holds the <u>most</u> unclassified contract revenue for facial recognition among government vendors.

Clearview AI offers a searchable database of faces to agencies like the Department of Defense and Homeland Security as well as to local police forces.

Microsoft, which is mainly a participant in the federal marketplace to sell IT services to customers like the Department of Defense and Homeland Security, is pushing for responsible use of facial recognition. The tech giant made a <u>push</u> for "government regulation and responsible industry measures" in 2018. In 2020, it barred police from using its facial recognition tool.

Last month, Microsoft said it would discontinue facial analysis tools that purport to detect a person's emotional state due to inaccuracies and discriminatory applications. It will allow access to its tools based on a narrow set of approved use cases.

Government Is a Big Buyer

The government has awarded \$76 million worth of unclassified facial recognition-related contracts in the last two decades, according to Bloomberg Government data—and that doesn't cover the likely trove of classified contract dollars involving federal law enforcement or the military.

The Transportation Security Administration exemplifies the attitude of procurement officers about the technology. "While our use of facial recognition technology remains in the pilot phase of development, it seems to be showing promise as a method of accurately verifying identity," an agency spokesperson said in a statement for Bloomberg Government. "TSA has no plans to limit our current use of facial recognition."

Advocates say if the government is to continue buying facial recognition tools from the private sector, it first needs to institute more regulations on where facial recognition can be applied and establish better standards to evaluate. Some also want new laws putting limits on the technology.

The AI industry suffers from a lack of uniformity and coordination, said Emrah Gultekin, CEO and co-founder of facial recognition contractor Chooch. His company's facial recognition helps military analysts sort through millions of images from drones and satellites.

AI standards require constant upgrades to keep up with changes in the tech. Because standards are inconsistent across the industry, the government is "reliant on what commercial suppliers say their software can do," said Ellen Broad, associate professor of cybernetics at Australian National University, in an interview.

"There needs to be real scrutiny of the technologies being used and clear rules and mechanisms in place about how they're used," she said.

Contractors maintain that how the tool is used matters most. "If you have the proper use case and the proper controls around the technology, then you can justify it in a positive way," Clearview AI CEO and co-founder Hoan Ton-That, said in an interview.

Law Enforcement Is Most Dicey

Critics point to law enforcement as one of the most problematic uses of facial recognition. Gultekin conceded that law enforcement applications can "get very hairy very quickly."

Facial recognition by police "is most often deployed in communities targeting Black and Brown people in ways that allow police surveillance of Black and Brown communities," Caitlin Seeley George, a director at the digital rights advocacy group, Fight for the Future, said in an interview.

The systems use tools like mugshot databases, "which are disproportionately filled with Black and Brown faces, as sources of comparison," she said.

Much depends on how the system is set up. Ton-That said Clearview's algorithms have never led to a wrongful arrest. The database doesn't include a percentage match for accuracy, so officers can't claim a near-certain match as evidence in court. He countered that facial recognition can offer "a fairer system overall," since suspects' defense teams can use the technology to identify witnesses or corroborate testimony.

There are applications that earn approval even from critics. Broad said facial recognition could be used so autonomous vehicles can delineate between human faces and objects or to assist people with visual impairments to identify visitors in their homes.

Building Datasets

Datasets mark the biggest problem in creating workable and unbiased facial recognition tools. If human biases are encoded into machine learning models, it leads to failures. For example, an AI tool trained on all White faces can't accurately recognize people of color.

"The technology is inherently biased, both in its current algorithms, which we know are worse at identifying Black and Brown faces, faces of women, gender nonconforming people, basically anyone who's not a White male," Seeley George said.

Companies can reduce bias by introducing more data into their datasets, but that can cause its own problems. Ton-That touts its facial recognition search engine, which engineers trained using 70 million images. Typical models use just five million faces. As Clearview AI added more data, engineers saw a decrease in bias and inaccuracy.

"To collect more data, it's also a pitfall because you're basically collecting other people's information," Gultekin said. "It's this cycle that you need more data to lessen the bias, but you also need to create guardrails to make sure that we're all working through a very similar system in order to deploy these computer vision models."

Some companies opt not to build datasets off of publicly scraped images entirely.

The practice is "not something that we will vouch for," Teresa Wu, vice president of innovation and client engagement at Idemia, told Bloomberg Government. "It's not ethical. You have no consent of the subject and it's not legally obtained data."

Feds Tread Lightly

There is no federal legislation guiding the development of facial recognition technology, despite the myriad concer	rns
around privacy and bias. Some cities and states have passed bans or rules governing its use, like Illinois's Biometr	ic
Information Privacy Act, which creates standards for companies regarding the collection of biometric data.

The most straightforward attempt by agencies to provide direction to the private industry on developing biometric identification standards comes from the National Institute for Standards and Technology, which has been working with the industry since the 1990s. NIST conducts a Face Recognition Vendor Test that rates Clearview AI and Idemia at the top of the industry with close to 100 percent accuracy.

Lawmakers have since called for additional standards and regulations.

Congress failed last year to advance a bill (<u>S. 2052</u>) that would institute the moratorium on facial recognition technology. Rep. <u>Don Beyer</u> (D-Va.) introduced a bill last month to ban law enforcement officers' use of facial recognition on body camera footage (<u>H.R. 8154</u>). Senators earlier this year for <u>more transparency</u> in how facial recognition data is collected by companies like Idemia at security checkpoints.



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Advocates say if the government is to continue buying facial recognition tools from the private sector, it first needs to institute more regulations on where facial recognition can be applied and establish better standards to evaluate. Some also want new laws putting limits on the technology.

The Al industry suffers from a lack of uniformity and coordination, said Emrah Gultekin, CEO and co-founder of facial recognition contractor Chooch. His company's facial recognition helps military analysts sort through millions of images from drones and satellites.

Al standards require constant upgrades to keep up with changes in the tech. Because standards are inconsistent across the industry, the government is "reliant on what commercial suppliers say their software can do," said Ellen Broad, associate professor of cybernetics at Australian National University, in an interview. "There needs to be real scrutiny of the technologies being used and clear rules and mechanisms in place about how they're used," she said.

Contractors maintain that how the tool is used matters most. "If you have the proper use case and the proper controls around the technology, then you can justify it in a positive way," Clearview Al CEO and co-founder Hoan Ton-That, said in an interview.

Law Enforcement Is Most Dicey

Critics point to law enforcement as one of the most problematic uses of facial recognition. Gultekin conceded that law enforcement applications can "get very hairy very quickly."

Facial recognition by police "is most often deployed in communities targeting Black and Brown people in ways that allow police surveillance of Black and Brown communities," Caitlin Seeley George, a director at the digital rights advocacy group, Fight for the Future, said in an interview.

The systems use tools like mugshot databases, "which are disproportionately filled with Black and Brown faces, as sources of comparison," she said.

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Much depends on how the system is set up. Ton-That said Clearview's algorithms have never led to a wrongful arrest. The database doesn't include a percentage match for accuracy, so officers can't claim a near-certain match as evidence in court. He countered that facial recognition can offer "a fairer system overall," since suspects' defense teams can use the technology to identify witnesses or corroborate testimony. There are applications that earn approval even from critics. Broad said facial recognition could be used so autonomous vehicles can delineate between human faces and objects or to assist people with visual impairments to identify visitors in their homes.

Building Datasets

Datasets mark the biggest problem in creating workable and unbiased facial recognition tools. If human biases are encoded into machine learning models, it leads to failures. For example, an Al tool trained on all White faces can't accurately recognize people of color.

"The technology is inherently biased, both in its current algorithms, which we know are worse at identifying Black and Brown faces, faces of women, gender nonconforming people, basically anyone who's not a White male," Seeley George said.

Companies can reduce bias by introducing more data into their datasets, but that can cause its own problems. Ton-That touts its facial recognition search engine, which engineers trained using 70 million images. Typical models use just five million faces. As Clearview Al added more data, engineers saw a decrease in bias and inaccuracy.

"To collect more data, it's also a pitfall because you're basically collecting other people's information," Gultekin said. "It's this cycle that you need more data to lessen the bias, but you also need to create guardrails to make sure that we're all working through a very similar system in order to deploy these computer vision models." Some companies opt not to build datasets off of publicly scraped images entirely.

The practice is "not something that we will vouch for," Teresa Wu, vice president of innovation and client engagement at Idemia, told Bloomberg Government. "It's not ethical. You have no consent of the subject and it's not legally obtained data."

Feds Tread Lightly

There is no federal legislation guiding the development of facial recognition technology, despite the myriad concerns around privacy and bias. Some cities and states have passed bans or rules governing its use, like Illinois's Biometric Information Privacy Act, which creates standards for companies regarding the collection of biometric data.

The most straightforward attempt by agencies to provide direction to the private industry on developing biometric identification standards comes from the National Institute for Standards and Technology, which has been working with the industry since the 1990s. NIST conducts a Face Recognition Vendor Test that rates Clearview Al and Idemia at the top of the industry with close to 100 percent accuracy.

Lawmakers have since called for additional standards and regulations.

Congress failed last year to advance a bill (<u>S. 2052</u>) that would institute the moratorium on facial recognition technology. Rep. <u>Don Beyer</u> (D-Va.) introduced a bill last month to ban law enforcement officers' use of facial recognition on body camera footage (<u>H.R. 8154</u>). Senators earlier this year for <u>more transparency</u> in how facial recognition data is collected by companies like Idemia at security checkpoints.
