Lt. Gen. John D. Bansemer is the Assistant Director of National Intelligence for Partner Engagement at the Office of the Director of National Intelligence. In his present capacity, he serves as Director of National Intelligence lead for integration, coordination and collaboration with the intelligence community's domestic, international, military, and private sector partners. In this role his duties include the optimization of intelligence community engagement with foreign partners and ensuring the fullest utilization of U.S. national intelligence capabilities in support of military operations.

General Bansemer entered the Air Force in 1987 as a distinguished graduate of Officer Training School at Lackland Air Force Base, Texas. His career has included a variety of operational intelligence, surveillance, and reconnaissance duties. He has commanded at the detachment, squadron, group and wing levels. He has served on the National Security Council staff where he provided advice and expertise on a range of national security issues. He has also served on the Air Staff. Prior to his current assignment, he served as the Deputy Chief, Central Security Service of the National Security Agency and was the Director of Intelligence for U.S. European Command.

**Dr. Kathleen Fisher**  
**Chair of the Computer Science Department at Tufts University**



Professor Kathleen Fisher is Chair of the Computer Science Department at Tufts University. Previously, she was a program manager at DARPA where she started and managed the HACMS and PPAML programs, a Consulting Faculty Member in the Computer Science Department at Stanford University, and a Principal Member of the Technical Staff at AT&T Labs Research. She received her PhD in Computer Science from Stanford University. Kathleen is an ACM Fellow and a Hertz Foundation Fellow. Service to the community has been a hallmark of Kathleen's career. She has served as Chair of the ACM Special Interest Group in Programming Languages (SIGPLAN) and as Program Chair for three of SIGPLAN's marquee conferences: PLDI, OOPSLA, ICFP. She has also served as an Associate Editor for TOPLAS and as an Editor of the Journal of Functional Programming. Kathleen has long been a leader in the effort to increase diversity and inclusion in Computer Science: she was Co-Chair of the Computing Research Association's Committee on the Status of Women (CRA-W) for three years, and she co-founded SIGPLAN's Programming Language Mentoring Workshop (PLMW) Series. Kathleen is a recipient of the SIGPLAN Distinguished Service Award. She is Chair of DARPA's ISAT Study Group and a member of the Board of Trustees of Harvey Mudd College.
